### **Introduction**

Attica School District 511 is located in the southern tier of South Central Kansas. The school is in the northwest corner of Harper County and is approximately 55 miles southwest of Wichita, Kansas. The school district boundaries lie in Township #1 of Harper County. The district employees approximately 22 certified staff members and 10 classified staff. The City of Attica is quite vibrant as it hosts the annual major rodeo days. It is a massive undertaking for a small community but with everyone's help, it is a huge success. There are approximately 165 students expected this year. The district have a vibrant Transition to Career program for the high school students and have implemented a robust individual plan of study for their junior high students. Five years ago they entered in a successful cooperative venture with the Argonia Public Schools and combined both district's junior and high school football teams. The Attica community is very supportive of all athletic programs and academic programs.

The city and schools work together to get solid programs for the children of the district. The Wellness Center had a philanthropic beginning and continues to evolve and provide more and more program opportunities for both the students and the general public. The large facility houses a full basketball court with seating for 1,000 spectators. The Wellness Center also houses a meeting room, a fully equipped weight room, a large foyer that adapts for exercise classes and several nice locker rooms. The entities of the community also provide adult supervision during the open hours.

The school facility is nicely maintained and is also fully equipped with classrooms of computer availability along with a major lab that is used for instruction and testing. The Board of Education has invested heavily in technology and training. The K-12 school is using Promethean Boards in nearly all classrooms and the district has a one to one initiative with Chrome Books for grades 6-12.

Attica is proud of its school and of the successes of students and staff. With a new vision to help each student find their passion and evidentially career path Attica is determine to meet all their student's needs.

# The District's Accomplishments and Challenges

#### **Accomplishments:**

The Attica district has increased its graduation rate to the high 90% range. Test scores are at a steady rate but classes are being initiated to help students with test taking skills as well as ACT preparation. Technology has been at the forefront to help students use it as a learning tool and for their future education. New emphasis for this year is the Transition to Career Program that is designed to give students real world practical experience in various career interest of their choice.

Through a collaboration of four districts: USD #255 South Barber, USD #254 Barber County North, USD #361 Chaparral, and USD #511 Attica. Attica will be hosting an Automotive Standard of Excellence Certified program. The accrediting university is Pratt Community College. Pre-enrollment numbers for the program are at fifteen students. With the capacity of twenty students the program looks to grow. Along with hosting this program Attica Public Schools have added five new Career and Technical Pathways in the district. By adding these programs the district allows students to access industrial certification programs and also add CTE funding to the school budget. In the 2020-21 school year Attica looks to host a certified Welding program through PCC and also add middle and high school FFA.

#### **Challenges:**

Attica is like many districts in Kansas and must deal with the reality of declining enrollment. It is good to note that the enrollment for Attica has been stable over the last several years and has actually increased. The district, board, and community are working to make the environment the best that it can be each day.

The decline in the oil industry has caused the district to lose about 30% of valuation which makes it much more difficult to raise local revenues. This low evaluation inhibits revenue and stunts the district's ability to fund capital outlay planning.

Health insurance is based on the school's small group community Blue Cross Blue Shield plan. Attica considered joining a group plan but the buy in costs were to cost prohibitive. Attica's premium had no increase for the incoming school year. Attica is currently providing 75% coverage of a single health care premium to their licensed staff. Competing with districts that pay 100% of a single cost can make it difficult in the recruiting process.

The schools in Attica are a great place to work and we hope that the efforts that are being made by the Board of Education will pay off in enhancing the opportunities for students, staff, and patrons.
